10 DAYS OF GIVING


Winona ORC gave back to the community by participating in Merchants Bank annual 10 Days of Giving.

Observations of a Job Coach



Jesse Thill, a job coach who has been with WORC for 12 years, has left us and taken a position at Hiawatha Valley. He put this on his Facebook page the night before his last day at WORC. This is an amazing testimony to the power of what WORC means to us all.

I've seen people walk through the doors all about themselves. I've seen them constantly on their phones, and with the mindset that the world rotates around them. I've seen them scared, unsure, and not very confident. I've also seen those same people walk out those same doors, confident, caring, and quick to put someone else before themselves. I've seen them shy, laid back, and hesitant, only to become brave and outgoing. Sure we all grow up naturally, and we change in time, but this is different. People become a totally different person when they become a part of this community.

When you first walk through these doors you're immediately accepted. Chances are it's the first time in your life where you didn't have to fight for it. The outcome doesn't change pending on your skin color or on your body shape. It's a loving atmosphere and it makes you take notice. One of the first things that you notice is that fear doesn't really exist here. Sure these people don't want to be hurt, but at the same time they're not going to let some pain dictate their lives. Some of these people have been judged all of their lives. Some have been in life altering accidents, and some have even had their own family members abandon them. Yet they move on and enjoy life, which so many struggle to do. The strength that they possess is inspiring. Especially since they never let a physical or mental road-block get in the way of their happiness.

See once the fear is gone, the heart does all the expressing. The love that's behind these walls is congruent. You don't think, you just listen to your heart and do. It's not how do I benefit? It's how do we benefit? This theory is always lead by example. So many times I've seen a person who's unable to heat up their lunch open a door for a person who's in a wheel chair. Yet that same person who's in a wheel chair will heat up that persons lunch. Everyone looks out for each other. If someone is short on food, well then food will be offered. If someone is having trouble with a job well then then that person will be helped.

By now you know that I'm talking about my profession, which most people know that I work with disabled people. Yet I'm only using that term as that's what society

identifies them by. I've seen plenty of them have a larger vocabulary than staff. I've seen them fix microwaves and even fix cars. I've seen them name entire rosters of sports teams and quote literally 15 minutes straight of a movie. See to me they're equal. To me they're just another person, actually better yet they're my friends.

I use the term friends as a friend's reliable, they care about you, and they can be trusted. Time and time again these people are displaying a true friendship. If one of the clients see's that you're down they'll immediately stop what they're doing to attend. Perhaps to give you a hug, perhaps to give advice, or to listen. Either way they'll give it their all to cheer you up. These people will also push you to better yourself as any friend would do. I recall the one time where a client noticed that I was interested in a girl. He stared in my eyes and on his communication board he told me to go make a move haha. Originally from the get-go I was going to wait to approach her until after work, to be professional. However he kept getting on my case just to make sure that I wouldn't back out. Since I was being called out I had to make the approach there haha....It's a guy thing.

The people in this community will also push you out of your comfort zone. When I attended my first ORC banquet they had a dance and a DJ. I was new, shy, and honestly a little scared to go dance. Well the clients weren't having none of that. A group of them went up to the DJ, requested the song "Jesse's girl, "and literally drug me out to the dance floor to go dance. And you know what??? It was a great time and experience!!!! See in both of those cases the guys had nothing to benefit by pushing me to be better...ok they probably had a good old laugh by dragging me out to the dance floor against my will but overall it's always about putting others first and about thinking with your heart.

The staff at ORC are there to teach the clients work skills. I think many staff, including myself came in here thinking that we were going to go in and do all the teaching. It's funny as it's totally the other way around. People see first-hand the battles that some of these guys have faced, or are facing. They see first-hand that you can't let an obstacle stop you from enjoying life. People also see first-hand that working together as a team far outweighs trying to do something by yourself. They see all of this and they apply it to become a better and a stronger person. People also feel the love and they learn to lose the fear. The environment in general is contagious and whether you want to or not you change.

Tomorrow will be my final day at ORC. I've came across such amazing clients and staff during my time who've made such an impact on my life. Honestly, I would not trade my time there for anything!!! It's gonna be a tough day tomorrow, but I'm also at ease knowing that I'll be visiting often. I'm already looking forward to this year's banquet, though I won't officially be a staff member anymore. On a final note, I think that I can speak for all former and current staff when I say, "Thanks for teaching us. It's truly because of you that we are the people who we are today!!"
